#### **Lakefield Houses and Buildings – File 1**

1. This house was located on 144 Water St. in the early 1950's and for a short time was used as a tavern. About 1854 it became a private dwelling until the 1940's when it became the Lakefield Gospel Chapel. Some time later it was demolished and a new chapel built on its location.
2. William and Mrs. Stablers (nee Fitzgerald) home about 1910-1920. Located at 9 Burnham – 120 years later home is still in Stabler's name as Doris the wife of Gerald (William's son) still resides there.
3. Burleigh Falls Residents
4. Photos of 132 Water St. Built in 1876 by millwright John Dinwoodie. John served on Council in 1876 and was a Reeve in 1878-79. This home has only had ownership under their names (Dinwoodie for 30 yrs, Drayton for 20 years, Hendren for 95 years). The high gables and specially shaped windows give the home a unique appearance. It was purchased by James Hendren in 1920, and the verandah was added later by James' uncle, Able Hendren. James was in the livery business before the turn of the century and was a harness maker for the first 25 years of the new century. James' son, Wallace during the late 1930's-early 1940's was Village Constable, Tax Collector, Assessor, Dog Catcher and Janitor of the Village Hall, all for a few dollars.
5. The Cement Company terrace on 37 Rabbit St. with burn about the late 1970's (1870's). The little white home is located on the east end of Baptie's Lane.
6. The Orr Home located on 64 Regent St. This home was built before 1876 by Garnett Galvin. Since 1921 it has been the Orr residence for 81 years.
7. The Treasure Crest (15 Queen St.) was built before September 1890 as it is shown in a picture taken during the visit of Lord Stanley to Lakefield. For a short time in the 1930's Beecher and Ella Blake and their young son Gordon, lived there. Today this is part of Blake's Village Square.
8. Lakefield Travel (#11 Queen St.). Dr. Alexander Bell lived here from 1874-1878. The doctor was also Village Clerk from April 1884-March 1900. In the mid 1940's Guy Peel ran a toy factory there that manufactured children's wooden wheelbarrows. The company was known as Peels Peerless Products. Bob Delledone worked in the factory after school and during holidays. Bob also lived in the home in 1937. In 1938 it was on the door of this home there was a card placed that read Scarlet Fever – the card was there from November-February and Delledone had to stay in the hotel and milk and groceries had to be left on the verandah when delivered. At this time Bob also had to have a blood transfusion

on the kitchen table. The blood was taken by a large needle from my father's arm and placed in my uncle. Dr. Alex and John Fraser were the doctors.

9. 76 Queen St. This home, owned by Robert Kenneth Ward, built by Abel Hendren in 1888 for James R. and Dr. John R. Fraser. Both men were Lakefield doctors who moved to Lakefield a few years before and resided at 169 Queen St.. Dr. John had three sons who all became doctors. The youngest son Alex, was in practice with his father for many years and took over the practice when his father retired. The home was originally built for \$2275.00.
10. This home is located on the North-East corner of Regent and Albert St. It is listed as 56 Regent, the home behind is 52 Regent. Both these homes were built by Jas Trennum, and by 1875, John C. Balson was a tenant at 52 Regent St. and Thomas Beagley owned and lived at 56 Regent St. In 1905, both homes were purchased by George V. Hill who lived at 52 Regent St. This home stayed in the Hill family until 1946. That year the home was bought by Tom and Margaret Moore and is still in the Moore name today after 51 years. In 1941, number 56 Regent was purchased by Charles and Mary Birch who were the owners for the next 35 years.
11. 15 Albert St. owned by Alex Nichols. This home was built in 1861 by local contractor Jonathan Griffen who was the building contractor for St. John the Baptist Anglican Church on the corner of Queen and Regent St. Jonathan was also the building contractor for the new four room brick school built in 1873 on Ermitinger St. and many other buildings, barns, and homes in the area. The back portion of this building was also the bottling plant for Fred Erskine's and Percy Darling's Dairy's. For the past 50 years the place has also been resident apartments.
12. St. Andrews Presbyterian Church. This is the second church with the same name in Lakefield. The first church was built with local stone in 1863 and was located on 76 Caroline St. on the south-east corner of Caroline and Katherine St. The second church is located on the south-west corner of Bridge and Caroline St. By March 1931, the basement of the new church was ready and services were held there for the next 2 years.
13. On the way from the train to the boat dock (early 1900's). The building on the left was the People's Christian Association Hall which was built in 1877 by the five Protestant religions: Anglican, Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Bible Christian Church. On April 11, 1877 a committee was formed to oversee the construction, Issac Garbutt (Baptist), John C. Sherin (Methodist), John Hall (Bible Christian), Joseph Nelson (Presbyterian), Robert Strickland (Anglican). At 4pm that afternoon the ground was broken and the official cornerstone was laid by Mrs. Robert Strickland. The cornerstone was taken from the fireplace hearth from the first home built by Samuel Strickland. 18 days later (April 29<sup>th</sup>) the P.C.A. Hall was ready for use. It had been designed and built entirely by volunteers. Its location was 106 Queen St., the present site of Brewer's Retail. The structure

measured 60x40 with a peak height of 22 feet. To help pay off construction costs, the committee organized an excursion which was advertised in both the *Ptbo Examiner and Review*. The first meeting in the new hall was conducted by the Evangelist Katherine Charlotte Strickland, daughter of Robert and was reported as a place for all denominations to meet. For the next several years the hall was home to a variety of religions and social events. A typical example being the concert held in January 1886 by the Barnardo Home children from Peterborough. The adult admission was 25 cents with a package including train fare from Peterborough, plus admission at 50 cents. In May 1893, Caroline Strickland purchased the hall for \$620 with the proceeds divided amongst the four remaining Protestant churches. The Strickland Canoe Co. was formed the year before in 1892 and that following year the company suffered a great loss from a fire which damaged the factory and equipment. The exact location of the factory is not known but the paper stated that the Strickland building was located near the river – likely one of the mill-line buildings on Water St. Some of the factory employees were hired immediately at Peterborough Canoe and some waited for the Strickland Company to re-open. In July 1904, the Gordon and Strickland companies amalgamated to form the Lakefield Canoe Building and Manufacturing Company Ltd. Forty thousand shares were placed on the market at \$100 per share. The new company proposed building both boats and houses. The directors were Edward Rolleston Tate (lumberman), John E. Baptie (carpenter), John E. Richardson (boat builder, George Alexander Baptie (carpenter), and Harry Graham Fitzgerald (hardware merchant). Once again, on December 23, 1910, fire destroyed the factory that had been enlarged to 50x180 feet. A larger brick building was erected by the Baptie Brother on the same site only much closer to the sidewalk. In May 1911, Gilbert Gordon, son of the famous boat builder Thomas Gordon was employed as company foreman. The company was now building larger motor craft. One such craft was the *Elizabeth* built for Mr. Russel Dodworth of Pittsburg who owned Boschin, a Stoney Lake cottage located on Dodworth's land. The *Elizabeth* was the first inboard to be built in the new brick factory. A part of the building that today is located at 98 Queen St. was built in 1911 to be used as a showroom and paint shop upstairs, today the building with its many editions is a restaurant.

14. The Scriver home was moved when the first part of I.D.A was built in 1959 and was relocated to 39 Oxford St. From 1916-1920 this is the located where Lakefield Colonial Glass was manufactured.
15. Richard Hills Hotel was located at 90 Clementi on the south-east corner of Bridge and Clementi. Richard's first hotel was located on the south-east corner of Nelson and Clementi was burned shortly after it opened in 1858. It was the first hotel to open on the Smith or west side of Lakefield.
16. 48 Reid St. showing Keneth Remenent in May 1941.

17. Sabatino home about 1930 located at 34-36 Albert St. on the north-west corner of Albert and Rabbit St. The west half of the home was built in the late 1860's by Jonathan Griffin. In 1876, it was occupied by Alfred Gill. In 1905 the east half was built by Donato Sabatino for his large family. The home was in the Sabatino name for 50 years. In 1951, the house was purchased by Tom and Judy Soles who lived there until 1970. The small building to the right side of the home which is located beside the railway tracks is oil storage for filling the trucks to oil the streets.
18. Originally, the Frank D'Arcy home built in 1860. In 1864 the home was purchased by John Hull and it was in the Hull name until the 1940's. Young boy in the photo is unnamed. This home is located on the north-east corner of Bridge and Clementi Streets.
19. The Armstrong home located at 88 Albert St. The labor and materials were supplied by a lumber place in Lakefield for the Armstrong family. Home built around 1900. Boy unnamed.
20. Etta Balsdom with her dog on the Town Hall property. Her father was Janitor of the new Town Hall in 1890 and lived upstairs in the 1<sup>st</sup> Town Hall that faced the river which also served for a time as the Ward school.

**File 2:**

21. After the Power House fire (1920). What remains is a small building on the break wall. This was the second time that the Power House burned, it was located about the same area and the fire was about 1899. The larger building, the east side of the water, powered mills. South of the bridge is Baptie's Planing Mill.
22. The new Hydro Power house opening in 1928 or 1929.
23. The construction of the new Hydro Power House from 1926-1929. Picture taken in 1927.
24. The Canada Cement Company on left, Power House on right side.
25. The Bailey Home. For a number of years this was known as the Bailey House, it was located just north east of the village on Strickland St. in Douro. Mr. Edward Bailey was one of the supervising staff at the Cement Plant, he was also credited with having the home covered with stucco.
26. 44 Bridge built from local stone by Frank D'Arcy. Frank also built and operated the first grist mill on the west side of Lakefield. The mill was built in 1854 and the home in the early 1860's. The water-powered mill was located in today's Curtis Park. About mid 1860's the home and mill were purchased by John Hull. John served on Council in 1876-77-82-88 and 1896. He was also Village Reeve

- from 1899-1900. The home remained in the Hull name until 1945 when it was purchased by Dr. and Mrs. Reginald Campbell.
27. Westove. Located at 665 Smith St. it was built soon after 1862 and was owned by Catherine Agnes Strickland Traill, daughter of Catherine Parr Traill. Parr Traill lived here for 35 years and did some of her finest writing. In 1862, this property was bought from Samuel and Robert Strickland by Catherine Agnes Strickland. Soon after, the one and a half story frame home was erected. This home has become one of the most popular tourist attractions. A plaque in front of the home was erected by the Archeological and Historical Site Board some years ago. In 1944, it became the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Grant, who was a local lawyer and served as Reeve for a 3-year term.
  28. This home was built in 1873 by Francis Bowher on 83 Strickland St. The main part of the home was destroyed by fire in the 1930's but the remaining part of the house was lived in until the 1950's.
  29. This picture was taken in 1903 of the Dench Home (North Douro Lodge), the 3<sup>rd</sup> home built on this property by Robert Quarrels Dench. Robert died around 1902 and willed the home and farm to his son Bernard Quarrels Dench. The farm and home that is located on the south-west corner of Block Rd and Hwy #134. The property was in the Dench name from 1860-late 1950's. Both Robert and Bernard were known for great story-telling abilities.
  - 29b The House of Refuge (Old Folks Home), was built in the late 1910's on the back road or Smith road to Young's Point. Today this is one of the nicer retirement homes with all its hardwood trim.
  30. Ashelworth (The Atwood Home) near the Grove School, now part of school property. Taken in 1975. Mrs. Atwood was the daughter of Mrs. Traill, and when Mrs. Atwood died, the home was willed to her daughter Annie Atwood who passed away in 1872.
  31. The Payne's first home in Dummer, built in 1831.
  32. The home on the right side is 31 Caroline on the left 29 Caroline. The home on 31 Caroline on the north-west corner of Caroline and Nassau roads was built in 1907 it was purchased by Charles Crawford and was in that name until the 1990's. 29 Caroline was built in 1890; in 1955 the home was purchased by Jack Kelly and is still in the Kelly name today.
  33. The Soleman Begley home built by Soleman in 1873 while his family lived in a tent on the lot. In 1895, during the canal construction, the home was moved to the south-west corner of the lot. Soleman was a brick-layer and bricked several homes in the Katherine St. area, plus other homes in and around Lakefield.

34. 15 Albert St. located on the south-west corner of Albert and Regent. This home was built in 1861 by Jonathan Griff, a local building contractor. Jonathan was the builder for St. John the Baptist Anglican Church on the south-end corner of Queen and Regent St, also in 1873 he was the building contractor for Lakefield's 4 room brick school, on Ermitinger St. He also built many homes, buildings, barns in Lakefield and area. The back part of this home was used as a bottling plant for Erskine's Dairy and later Daring Dairy. Both these families lived here while they ran their businesses.
35. 15 Queen St. (the Treasure Chest) now a part of the village square. Built before Sept.1890, as home is shown in a picture taken during a visit of Lord Stanley's visit to Lakefield. For a short time in the late 1930's Beecher and Ella Blake and their young son Gordon lived here.
